A Message from the Principal...

Dear Braeburn Families and Friends,

Well, it looks like the snow has finally decided to fall from the sky and remind us that we are still in the winter season! I look forward to seeing our students outside during recess having fun in the winter blanket that covers our campus at the moment, just need the ice to melt. As a reminder if the wind chill is below 20 degrees Fahrenheit we will have indoor recess for student safety. The month of February has already provided us with many reasons to celebrate, including our 100th day of school! Our Kindergarteners paraded through the building with the most creative and imaginative hats! Our other learners were busy, busy, busy counting, sorting, predicting and creatively writing. What a fun day to celebrate our learning and tie in many mathematics skills and concepts along the way!

Reading is often a focal point next month, however I wanted to provide some tips to encourage reading to be at the forefront all year long. Here they are:

Always have books on hand. Keep a book in your bag or your car's glove compartment so your child can read in the car, or while waiting in line at the grocery store. Make regular trips to the library, and keep an eye out for books at bargain sales or garage sales. Or, consider holding a "book swap" with neighbors and friends. For birthdays or holidays, give your child new reading material.

Keep it up. Find ways to encourage your child to pick up new reading material to read once one book is finished. For instance, introduce him or her to a series or ask your librarian for books by the same author. Draft a "to-read" list that your child can check off. Consider subscribing your child to a magazine for kids.

Focus on their interests. Encourage your child to check out books from the library that feature characters or topics he or she is interested in. Whether it's NASCAR to NASA, the topic doesn't matter (as long as it's age-appropriate), as long as your child is reading.

Read out loud together. Schedule time to read aloud together, taking turns to read passages. Invite your entire family to participate. Use different voices for different characters, or invite your child to make sound effects for the story.

Make it a routine. Consider how to make reading habitual. Your family could have a weekly read-aloud session, or you and your child could read each night before bed.

Be a patient listener. No matter how slowly your young learner reads, avoid finishing sentences for your child. Gently correct mistakes, sound out words together, and let your child know you're proud.

Cut the distractions. During reading time, turn off or put away electronic devices. Make sure you follow the rule, too.

Ask questions. Ask your child about what he or she is reading in school or what you are reading together. Try open-ended questions such as, "Why do you think the character did that?" "What would you do if you were in that situation?" or "What do you think will happen next?"

Read beyond books. Invite your child to read menus, greeting cards, movie listings, newspaper comic strips, or directions to a destination. Word recognition is an important step for reading fluency, so consider using strips of paper and tape to label everyday objects in your home to boost your child's familiarity with words.

On the academic front, students continue to impress with their inquiry especially in science. Units on force have students investigating different materials and what variables impact their distance travelled. Our writer's workshop is moving forward steadily and the level of engagement is always amazing. In fourth grade our students are beginning to explore their first research project on Connecticut. The research is guided and students will be working closely with their teachers and our Library Media Specialist to learn about reliable sources, finding supportive details and more!

As we all bundle up during these frosty days, please take the time to stop in and check the lost and found! Many times students are so excited to get back to work that a mitten may wander or a hat may fly loose. A perfect time to stop in is during our March parent conferences which will take place on the 5th, 6th, 7th & 8th. Please look for more information coming home from your teacher regarding a specific date and time.



During the upcoming months, the secondary mathematics department supervisors at our middle schools will collaborate with elementary staff to develop math course placement recommendations for incoming sixth graders. West Hartford Public Schools strongly believe that, as students transition to middle school, each of our students must be placed into a nurturing environment where students will be effectively challenged and will be successful. Teachers will provide input regarding current student progress in Grade 5 mathematics including student performance on standardized measures, motivation, and use of higher order thinking skills. Placement recommendations will be determined later this spring, and a letter will be sent to parents/guardians by mail by June 1 with additional information from the middle school math department supervisors.

As always it is a joy to work with such a dedicated staff and superstar students.

CURRICULUM CORNER

Helping Your Child Learn Basic Math Facts

I think we all can remember back to our elementary school days and trying to learn our basic math facts. For those of us with strong memories, this may not have been a difficult task, but others may have struggled to remember them. Research tells us that although some students make sense of math concepts on their own, others struggle to connect meaning to basic math facts. Mastering basic math facts gives children a strong foundation for more complex math skills and procedures

Memorizing math facts helps us to speed up math tasks. Stopping to try to figure out the math fact disrupts the flow of the problem solving process. Mastering basic math facts also helps students to be able to do real world tasks, such as quickly figuring out how much two candy bars cost, finding the total score in a board game or figuring out how many of the dozen cookies they can eat so that there will be some left for the other members of the family.

You can make the process of learning math facts easier for your child by doing the following:

- * Play math fact games with a basic deck of cards. Turn over two cards and ask your child to add the total. Or if in grade 3 or above, ask them to multiply the numbers on the two cards. You can also use dominoes and/or dice and follow the same steps.
- * Group similar facts together - begin with teaching children facts that are one more and two more (7 +1, 9+1, 7+2, 9+2) Once they have mastered these, move on to one less or two less (6-2, 10-2).
- * Next, move on to facts that add and subtract 0
- * Teach facts that add 10 in the next grouping (10+8, 8+10)
- * Group double facts together (i.e. 4+4, 6+6). Once your child knows the double facts, move on to the doubles plus one facts so that they can take what they know about doubles and just add one more (i.e. 4+5, 6+7).
- * Finally, explore facts with a sum of ten (7+3, 6+4 etc.)

Grouping facts together versus teaching all of one fact together gives children a better conceptual understanding of the math that they are learning.



- Give your children 3 to 5 homes to go to in the neighborhood, in a certain order.
- Walkers will walk and busers will board buses
- Show them where an extra house key is kept.
- Remind your child to go to the designated neighbor, but then be certain to leave a note for you (on the back door or in the mailbox) as to where they are staying.

We suggest that you walk through a simulation with your children to give them the experience in a non-threatening situation.

OUTDOOR RECESS POLICY

The recess policy dictates that all students will go outside for recess if the temperature is 20 degrees or above. Students should be appropriately dressed to spend time outdoors during recess. Warm clothes, gloves, hats and boots are required during the winter months.

Children well enough to come to school should be well enough to be outside during recess. Exceptions for medical reasons may be granted on an individual basis.

In the event of inclement or severely cold weather, outdoor recess will be canceled.



Update on Privacy Law - Public Act 16-189

We believe that it is vital for all students in West Hartford Public Schools to be able to efficiently and effectively use digital tools that empower them in all phases of the learning process, including research, problem solving, content creation, communication, and collaboration. We also believe that we must be committed at all times to protecting students' privacy and providing them with a powerful and safe educational experience. To that end, the West Hartford Public Schools follow the legal requirements of Public Act 16-189 to promote the safety and security of all students and staff. In compliance with Connecticut State Law, we update online programs used within the district that house student data. The programs may be used district-wide, in a very small number of classrooms, or with individual students. The list will be updated each time the district enters into a new contract where student data is housed. 
